
The new season has started and the Avondale Youth Council is still working hard for the community. They have been attending community events, doing community cleaning projects, and developing their own businesses.

Avondale Community Council Elections 2010

The Avondale Community Council will be holding elections at the General Body meeting on November 16, 2010. The positions of Vice-President, Treasurer and three Trustee Seats are available. According to the By-laws Article 2, Procedures, Line 1: those persons whose dues are paid twenty-one calendar days prior to the annual meeting shall be eligible to vote and be elected to the Board of Trustees. You are eligible to vote if you were a paid member of the Avondale Community Council on or before October 27, 2010.

Avondale Residents Eligible to Receive Weatherization Assistance

The Avondale Community Council in conjunction with the Cincinnati Hamilton County Community Action Agency (CAA) want Avondale residents to save on their energy bills this winter.

The Home Weatherization Assistance Program provides home weatherproofing and energy efficiency services to qualifying individuals at no cost.

To make homes more energy efficient, safe and comfortable, CAA's weatherization team may:

- Service or replace heating equipment such as furnaces or water heaters;
- Test and/or replace the refrigerator, installing Energy Star appliances when appropriate;
- Seal return ducts to ensure proper air flow;
- Perform whole house diagnostic testing to determine air leakage;
- Repair missing plaster/drywall and missing/broken glass in windows;
- Insulate attics, sidewalls, floors and crawlspaces as needed;
- Insulate the water heater and pipes;
- · Replace incandescent bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs; and
- Provide consumer energy education.

Eligibility

To be eligible, applicants must:

- Be at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines;
- Be a resident of Hamilton County and
- Be responsible for paying your own utility bills for your house or apartment.

Ohio Recent Wartime Veterans Earn Bonuses



The Ohio Department of Veterans Services launched the Ohio Veterans Bonus Program. Anyone serving on active duty,

anywhere in the world, during specified times of war (Persian Gulf, Iraq & Afghanistan wars) are eligible for up to \$1,500 in bonus money. There are an estimated 200k veterans in Ohio eligible to apply. Applicants must have been legal residents of Ohio when they went on active duty as well as being current legal residents of the state. DePaul Cristo Rey High School Opening in June 2011

DePaul Cristo Rey high school is opening in Cincinnati. The Roman Catholic high school is designed to offer the benefits of private, college-prep education to students with limited economic means.

The school, located at 1133 Clifton Hills Avenue near Cincinnati State, will open to a freshman class of 100 students in June 2011. Sponsored by the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati this school is for students not well served by the public options but unable to afford Catholic high school tuition. Most of DePaul Cristo Rey's students will qualify for the Federal Free or Reduced Lunch Program and all will participate in the Corporate Work Study Program (CWSP) through which they will finance a portion of the cost of their education.

Cincinnati's new school is part of the national Cristo Rey Network, a group of 25 schools. All 704 graduates of the Cristo Rey Network Class of 2010 were accepted into college. The goal is that all graduates will leave school collegeready. A longer school day and year, academic assistance and counseling will be used to prepare students with a broad range of academic abilities.

Treasuring the Lives of our Elders

Over the years I have witnessed several programs and activities for the elderly come and go. I realize some of this is due to the lack of funding but some is due to the senior's lack of interest in sharing their passions and gifts. How can communities, organizations and churches engage our elderly so they can share their gifts and passions? I attend lots of senior meetings and community events.

Some are designed to engage the elderly and some are not so senior friendly. Several of the programs hardly ever include the elderly and we wonder why they are so isolated and not at the table making decisions.

Serving Older Adults Through changing Times (SO-ACT), was started to be a voice for the elderly. Over the years the passion and fight to serve the elderly has been lost in the politics. The City of Cincinnati funding for the elderly is virtually none existent. Sure we have several agencies around providing housing, home health care and some home medical assistance, but what about when they need food, medicine, funds to burial a loved one or transportation for non-medical events.

Recently the big question many are asking, is how to fight bed bugs and who is responsible for paying for these services. SO -ACT receives calls asking for bed covers and monies to pay for bed bug extermination.

SO-ACT depends on donations or pays expenses out of pocket. The lives of our elderly should never be watered down to the point that they are not included in what's going on. As treasures in our lives we need to design realistic programs and activities that impact their lives. Programs that allows them to give back to the community. Creating an environment that is friendly, safe and inclusive. Many of the black older adults income level is inadequate for today's economy. They need for their families and the community to step up and assist them any way they can.

Did You Know?

City to offer larger recycling bins, fewer pickups

Cincinnati recycles 13,000 tons of trash each year. Recently the city rolled out a new program intended to

expand on those efforts. Each resident will receive a new, 96-gallon cart that will be set out every other week, instead of being picked up each week. The new program is designed to hopefully save \$700,000 a year in collection fees and double the amount of recycled trash to 26,000 tons in the first twelve months of the program.


For every 10,000 tons of trash sent to the landfill, two (2) jobs are created. For every 10,000 tons of trash recycled, about thirty-five (35) jobs are created. This program will allow the City to save money on avoided landfill fees and waste collection, create jobs, reduce pollution, save natural resources, and save landfill space.

Most Avondale residents are in Phase 4 of the program which means all eligible residents will receive new recycle bins in January 2011 with pickup beginning on February 7, 2011. All single family homes, 1-4 multifamily structures in the city limits, mixed use buildings (a business on one floor and apartments above) and any residences

The new recycling program is not mandatory but residents can enroll in the RecycleBank and earn points based on how often and how much they recycle. Residents who recycle on a regular basis can expect to earn about \$300 a year in discounts and coupons from participating local, regional and national retailers.

Residents will receive information from the City of Cincinnati, Rumpke and RecycleBank one month in advance with instructions on how to register your individual household RecycleBank account. Register as soon as you receive your mailer and you'll start earning RecycleBank Points on the first pickup in your zone.

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
