One Nation, One State, One City, One Neighborhood Overweight

On September 21, 2010 the Avondale Community Council (ACC) premiered CNBC's "One Nation, Overweight." Residents watched the one hour special and won prizes during the commercials based on questions from the show. The



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documentary goes to the frontlines of this national health and economic crisis through the incredible

personal stories of Americans desperate to lose weight, revealing some of the diverse ways the nation is battling the bulge.

The obesity epidemic is acutely felt among the nation's youth, with nearly a third of American children either overweight or obese. Many are threatened with the early onset of diabetes, and some medical experts warn that for the first time in the history of our nation, this younger generation may be on track to have a shorter life span than their parents. CNBC goes back to school to examine the role the lunchroom plays in the national fight. Students at a high school in Virginia regularly flock to a school-sanctioned snack stand that sells a variety of candy and other junk food as early as 9:30am.

This year Cincinnati Public Schools (CPS)

joined United Fresh Foundation's "Salad Bar in Every School" campaign. It is a multi-year public health commitment from the fresh produce industry designed to bring fruit and vegetable salad bars to schools across America. This year four schools received salad bars. Neither of the Avondale schools were on the list. Representatives of the Avondale Community Council met with CPS and the Community Building Institute to find out what Avondale could do to get salad bars in the schools. Funding was found and both South Avondale and Rockdale will receive salad bars. They should be installed in the schools by XXXX

In 2007 the ACC along with Center for Closing the Health Gap implemented the Do Right! Campaign. The Campaign engages the community in the process of assessing Avondale to identify the specific problems that contribute to the obesity epidemic.
